### III. Bibliographical Notes

1. Durka, Gloria, Review of Meaning in Religious Education, Vol. 72, No. 1, (Jan/Feb, 1977)

Durka notes, among other things, that "...the chapters on myth and religion will be of special interest to religious educators since they attempt to present a purposeful world order wherein religious interpretation can extend the coherence of personal experience."

2. Copra, Fritjof, The Tao of Physics, Shambhola Press, Berkeley, 1975.

I suspect this holistic approach to the study of physics will be intriguing to most students of Polanyi. A research physicist explores the parallels between the underlying concepts of modern physics and the basic ideas of Eastern mysticism. The book is rich with ideas for overcoming the Western tendencies toward reductionism and helping to see reality in terms of new organic wholes.

3. Stillman, Peter G., "The Limits of Behaviorism: A Review Essay on B.F. Skinner's Social and Political Thought," The American Political Science Review, Vol. 69, 1975, pp. 202ff.

An excellent, penetrating, critical review of Skinner's social and political views as expressed in four of his publications: About Behaviorism, Beyond Freedom and Dignity, Science and Human Behavior, and Walden Two.

Part of the strength of this particular review lies in the fact that Stillman takes Skinner's criticism of his critics seriously and concentrates on an "internal refutation of Skinner's program."

I suspect that Polanyi students will find some of Stillman's arguments stimulating.
